Think of all those shopping for the vulnerable in their communities, the many front line workers who are keeping everything going for us right now and all those in the NHS helping the sick. We can show love in small quiet ways at home, helping out, cooking a meal, stopping to have a conversation or simply being tolerant of small irritations.

Good Friday and Easter are about the death and resurrection of Jesus – this is God's ultimate act of love to all of humanity. His promise of life after death and salvation for his followers. The Good Friday service is solemn and quiet and reflects our sadness at the pain and suffering of Jesus. The Easter Vigil is a beautiful service bringing light into the darkness in which the Easter fire and the lighting of the Paschal Candle reflecting our faith and hope in God's love for his people.

Earn some house points over the holidays!


The next competition is to produce a creative outcome of your choosing on the theme of Easter. Some ideas include:
