- 1. Sheffield has the highest ratio of trees to people of any city in Europe. 2.5 million trees.
- 2. As early as the fourteenth century, Sheffield was known as a place for the production of knives. It was even mentioned in Chaucer's Canterbury Tales.
- 3. Sheffield is known as a 'green city' It provides much energy from incinerating waste.
- 4. Sheffield boasts the world's oldest football club Sheffield F.C. It was formed in 1857, mainly by a group of cricketers. Sheffield F.C. won the F.A. Amateur cup in 1904.
- 5. Sheffield Wednesday is one of the oldest professional football clubs in the world, and the fourth oldest in the English leagues.
- 6. Sheffield Crucible Theatre stages the annual World Snooker Tournament
- 7. Sheffield hosted the world's first football tournament (played under Sheffield Rules) the **Youdan Cup** in Feb-March 1867, featuring 12 teams. The competition was won by local side Hallam at Bramall Lane. It preceded the FA cup by four years.
- 8. The Sheffield Rules was a code of football used between 1857 and 1877. They had a big influence on Football association rules, which later finally codified the game. Sheffield Rules introduced the concept of corners, free kicks, heading the ball, and goal keepers.
