Research tells us that parents and carers are the most important factor in career decisions. Young people face a challenging year ahead and your support can make a real difference.

How you can help

- Talk to your son or daughter about their ideas.
- Look at all the options with them.
- Visit online open events together in the autumn term.
- Encourage them to aim high and also to make a backup plan.
- Support them with applications. There are currently a number of deadlines at the end of January 2021.
- Support them to work for the best grades they can achieve. This will give them more choices.
- Encourage any opportunities to meet employers, such as talks or virtual careers fairs.
- Always use up to date information, especially at present when things can change rapidly.



What's happening 2020-21





- Even in a pandemic, young people still have decisions to make and deadlines to meet. Currently many applications must be made by the end of January so autumn is a time for research.
- Sixth form / college open events are online in the autumn term.
- Broadly speaking, there is a choice of 3 pathways: Academic pathway – A Levels. Apprenticeship pathway – paid jobs with training. There are also work based learning programmes that can help with gaining skills and experience. Vocational/technical pathway – study of a job or work sector.
- A Levels require around 5 GCSE grades 9-4 (9-5 or 9-6 for some subjects). Entry requirements for vocational courses and apprenticeships vary as they can be studied at different levels.
- There is a new qualification: T Levels are equivalent to 3 A Levels and involve study of a work sector with at least 45 days spent in industry. Locally they are available at Barnsley College and, from September 2021, Doncaster College.

- Young people seeking an apprenticeship need good English and maths and will be expected to fit into a workplace quickly.
